## Dear Families:

We want to begin by telling you how much we appreciate all the support you have provided toward your child's schooling during this unprecedented time. By now you have received Dr. McLaughlin's notification of the new end of school year date to be between May 28<sup>th</sup> and June 5<sup>th</sup>. Please know that we will continue to look for ways to stay connected to our students and to try to provide opportunities for some of our most beloved end of year traditions.

With this new end date in mind, I wanted to share what report cards will look like for the fourth quarter. Educators are developing essential components for learning that will frame what evidence is essential to gauge fourth quarter progress. This evidence may include activities, assignments, projects, and observations. The evidence submitted will be individualized for each student and will be communicated directly through your child's teacher(s). In grades Pre-K-6, students will not receive the traditional report card for the fourth quarter, instead they will receive a narrative in the areas of reading, writing, math, social studies, and science. In the area of Unified Arts, educators will provide information on the remote learning opportunities they have offered.

This narrative will provide feedback on your child's learning experience. We understand that each child's progress and engagement will vary due to a family's individual circumstances.
