Phase 1: Develop a Process

• 2018: Attended a NEASC based two-day workshop.

- Defined what a Merrimack graduate should look like at graduation.
 - What should a graduate know?

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• What should a graduate be able to do?

• October & November 2018, Presented surveys to school board for approval.



Phase 2: Synthesize, Distill, Analyze, and Create

1) Polled all stake holders Fall 2019

2) Asked for volunteers from students, faculty and the community who would be willing to serve on the committee

3) Fall/Spring 19/20: The newly formed committee aggregated all input .

4) Spring 2020: The committee created a working draft and began work on a visual representation.


Merrimack High School Graduates are Future Ready

Phase 3: Approval Process



2) Fall 2021: Reorganized the steering committee, because of staff changes.

3) October 2021: plan for approval by faculty.

Faculty approved by 94%.

4) Nov. 18th, 2021: Approved by the District CIA

(Curriculum, Instruction, and Assessment Committee)
